REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Registration will be done on-line through Badge Tracker. You must fill out a registration form and make payment in person or by credit card at the scout office. Your email address must be listed on registration form. Once payment has been received by Scout Council Service Center you will be emailed a code to go on-line to choose your classes. You may then print your schedule of classes from the website. You may change choice of classes up until the on-line registration cut off of January 7, 2011.

All Cub Scout leaders will be attending the 9:00 a.m. session together in the Auditorium. The course will be Cub Scouts 2010.

All Boy Scout leader will be attending the 1st Session together in the cafeteria. The course will be determined by National Instructor.

Incentives: We will have individual door prizes and for every adult that attends their Unit will be entered into a door prize drawing for a \$50 Scout Service Center credit (2 will be awarded).

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

To earn a **Bachelor of Science degree in the College of Cub Scouting, the College of Boy Scouting/Venturing or the College of Commissioners**, you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You must be a registered Scouter at the time you apply for the degree.
- For a B.S. degree from the College of Cub Scouting or the College of Boy Scouting/Venturing, you must have completed the Fast Start Training for your area of interest. For those seeking a B.S. degree from the College of Commissioners, you must have completed the Fast Start Training for either Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, or Venturing.
- You must have completed basic training for the program in which you seek your degree (i.e., Cub Scout Leader Specific Training for a degree from the College of Cub Scouting, Boy Scout Leader Specific Training and Boy Scout Introduction to Outdoor Skills for a degree from the College of Boy Scouting/Venturing, or Commissioner Basic Training for a degree from the College of Commissioners).
- Your Youth Protection Training must be current at the time you apply for a degree.
- You must complete three courses from those listed for your College (Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts/Venturing or Commissioner).
- You must complete three more courses from either the General Sessions, or from any College including your own (be careful not to take too many courses from your College as electives; **courses can only be used once for any purpose**).

MASTER OF SCIENCE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

To earn a Master of Science Degree in the College of Cub Scouting, the College of Boy Scouting/Venturing or the College of Commissioners you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You must be a registered Scouter at the time you apply for the degree.
- Your Youth Protection Training must be current at the time you apply for a degree.
- You must have earned a Bachelor's degree from the same college for which you are seeking a Master's degree.
- You must complete three additional courses from those listed for your College.
- You must complete three more additional courses from either the General Sessions, or from any College including your own.
- You must have completed the Council's Trainer Development Conference/The Trainer's EDGE/Train-the-Trainer course.
- You must have earned eight (8) service units. **An explanation of service units follows the requirements for a Ph. D. degree.**

Ph. D. DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

To earn a PH.D. Degree in the College of Cub Scouting, the College of Boy Scouting/Venturing or the College of Commissioners you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You must be a registered Scouter at the time you apply for the degree.
- Your Youth Protection Training must be current at the time you apply for a degree.
- You must have earned a Bachelor's and Master's degree in the same college for which you are seeking a Ph. D degree.
- You must complete three additional courses from those listed for your College. Completion of a Wood Badge course, National Camp School course(s) or a Philmont training course(s) can be substituted to meet this requirement, **but only at the Ph. D. level.**
- You must earn twelve (12) additional service units (**see below for definition of a service unit**).

Service Units

A participant can earn a service unit (SU) by serving as an **adult-to-adults instructor** at Council or District training opportunities. For example, a SU can be earned by serving on the BALOO/Webelos training staff, by serving as an instructor at a Boy Scout Leader Specific Training course or by serving as an instructor at the University of Scouting. 1. Please read the entire brochure; each college offers numerous classes.
2. Participants may attend classes offered by any College. If you are a first time participant and you are seeking a degree, it is recommended that you make your first four or five choices from your primary College. Some classes may have a limited class size and will be filled on first come, first serve basis before we process your application. If you develop two or three alternate choices, you should have little trouble getting at least three courses from within your College.
3. The University reserves the right to cancel classes or make appropriate changes in order to accommodate the largest number of Scouters.
4. To indicate your preferences, consult the attached **Class Schedule Grid** and make your choices accordingly. Please note that some courses are offered at more than one time. Please note the scheduled times for all your courses and schedule to avoid conflicts. Please select one course in each period column by circling the name of the course on the "GRID" form. **KEEP A COPY OF THE GRID & REGISTRATION FOR YOURSELF. YOU WILL ALSO NEED TO REGISTER ON-LINE. YOU WILL BE GIVEN A PASSWORD TO REGISTER ON-LINE AFTER YOU HAVE PAID REGISTRATION FEE AT SCOUT OFFICE. YOU CAN PRINT YOUR SCHEDULE ON-LINE. PLEASE BRING IT WITH YOU TO UNIVERSITY OF SCOUTING.**

COURSES AND DESCRIPTIONS

GENERAL SESSIONS

- GS 101 Adult Leader Recognition 1 hr**
The how and why of leader recognition, including official BSA awards and unofficial recognitions.
- GS 104 Safe Swim/Safety Afloat 2 hrs**
National Boy Scouts of America training course. You will receive a card after completion of course.
Rules and regulations for taking your scouts in or on the water.
- GS 106 Awareness of Behavioral/Medical Issues 1 hr**
How do ADD, ADHD LD, Asthma and other medical conditions affect Scouts in the Unit?
- GS 108 Recruiting People 1hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
How to find, involve, and keep good people.
- GS 109 Charter Organization Representative 1 hr**
This course explores the role of your sponsor's top person and the relationship that should be apparent between the Charter Rep and your scout Unit.
- GS 110 Dutch Oven Cooking 1 hr**
Dutch Oven cooking. Procedures and tips.
- GS 111 Scout Reach – Scouting for At Risk Youth 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
Explores the challenges faced by Scouting in the metropolitan area. Discussions will be held on single parent families, ethnic neighborhood and diversity of cultural, social and economic backgrounds
- GS112 Scouting Beyond the Unit 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
Introduction to District and Council level service and activities. Also, new training essentials will be discussed.
- GS 113 New Uniforming 1hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
Demonstration and discussion of proper uniforming for youth and leaders.
- GS 114 Financial Management for the Unit 1 hr**
Explains how to create a unit budget and how to raise the necessary funds. Instructor will discuss BSA fundraising guidelines.
- GS 115 Standard American Red Cross Basic First Aid 2 hr**
Tips and hints for emergency First Aid needed by Scout Leaders.
- GS 116 The Big Picture of Scouting 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
This course discusses the path of a new leader. After taking this course unit leaders should be able to grasp the concept of "Scouting's Big Picture".
- GS 117 Knot Tying 1 hr**
Have fun learning to tie the basic scout knots.
- GS 118 Useful and Edible Plants 1 hr**
How to differentiate between plants and know their uses.
- GS 119 PowerPoint Presentation for Unit Leaders 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
An informative presentation explaining how PowerPoint can be a unit leader's best friend. It will also explain the benefits of using PowerPoint at Blue & Gold, Open houses, recruitments, ceremonies and more.....
- GS 120 Council Policies, Procedures & Budget 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
Explains the guidelines of the Council and how they apply to you.

- GS 121 Camp Development Plan 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
This is a guide to the process of a successful Capital Campaign and how it can help the overall Scouting program in your Council by providing funds to improve camps and other Council facilities.
- GS 122 Public Relations: Scouting in the News. 1 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
This course will offer a fresh outlook on how unit leaders can utilize the positive impact of public relations in order to effectively showcase their activities. Participants will learn how to write effective press releases and much more....
- GS 123 Wilderness First Aid 2 hr (NOT OFFERED IN 2011)**
This course will give participants first-hand knowledge on how to apply first aid, when your typical tackle box is not available. After completing this course you will understand how to use nature's band-aids.
- GS 124 Leave No Trace Scouting 1 hr**
This class will tackle the principle of No Trace Scouting, and how it is important to leave facilities better than we found them for a variety of reasons. We will also discuss how to encourage scouts to participate in this concept. We will show you how to reward scouts for picking up after themselves.
- GS 125 Overcoming Social Barriers 1 hr**
This course will delve into the social issues of our day such as peer pressure, and the effects that broken families have on the psyche of the young people we serve. We will look at how we can motivate and empower these young people to be successful through scouting as well as overcome their social background.
- GS 126 Internet Safety: Protecting our Scouts 1 hr**
This session will take a look at the world of tech dangers. We will help adults, leaders, and parents to monitor their scout's activity as it pertains to text messaging codes and socially interactive web sites, like "Facebook" and "Myspace". At the end of this course, our hopes are that you will know what to look for and know how to protect the youth of our nation.
